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Response Strategy: Behavior Specific Praise

Prevent	Teach	Respond
<p>What can we do to prevent problem behaviors from occurring in the first place?</p>	<p>How can we use effective teaching techniques to teach new and replacement behaviors?</p>	<p>How can we respond to behaviors in ways to reinforce school appropriate behaviors?</p> <p>How do we respond in ways that do not reinforce the problem behavior and prevent further escalation of behavior?</p>

Behavior Specific Praise

- Provides learners with specific, positive verbal feedback indicating approval of a social or academic behavior
- Evidence-based classroom management strategy that improves learner behavior by letting the learner know **exactly** what she or he is doing to meet the behavioral expectations

Example and Non-Example

- Scenario: Anita is sitting quietly, listening to the teacher's lesson
- Example of Behavior Specific Praise: Anita, thank you for looking at me and listening during the lesson.”
- Non-Example: “Good job, Anita.”

Deceptively Simple

- In a 2017 study, Scott, Hirn & Cooper conducted 6,752 observations in Pre-K through High School settings
- Rate of behavior specific praise per minute:
 - Elementary: .007/minute
 - Middle School : .004/minute
 - High School: .005/minute

Steps You Can Take

- Determine your present rate of behavior specific praise
- Develop a plan that includes a specific, measurable and observable goal and self-management strategies to increase your use of behavior specific praise – write these down
- Follow your plan, collect data to monitor your impact and adjust your plan as needed
